

## CONTAINING THE ASIAN HORNET - AN INITIATIVE.

The discovery and - hopefully - successful elimination - of an Asian hornet's nest at Woolacombe, in N. Devon in the late summer has set alarm bells ringing throughout the UK. If a fertile queen could establish a nest at Woolacombe it is clear that, next summer, further Asian hornet nests may become established at any locality throughout the country - including in the vicinity of YOUR apiary. With this in mind, the need to develop a local plan-of-action to counter the threat is self-evident.

It is, therefore, proposed to hold a meeting at the Harberton Village Hall at 2 p.m. on Saturday,20<sup>th</sup>. January to decide on local initiatives aimed at containing any Asian hornets incursions as soon if any are identified next spring.

#### ASIAN HORNET; OPEN MEETING.

We are beekeepers near Totnes who are responding to the fact that Asian hornets were found in N. Devon this autumn as well as in Tetbury and North Somerset in 2016.

Having read Martyn Hocking's article published in both the November editions of 'Bee Craft' and 'Beekeeping' about the experience of finding Asian hornets in his apiary near Wooacombe in North Devon this autumn, we have been in touch with him. As a result we have called an:

#### WINTER VARROA TREATMENT.

Until the advent of the varroa mite, well-provisioned colonies were traditionally left to their own devices through the winter until the first inspection in mid-spring. Now, however, mid-winter provides the beekeeper with an opportunity to deal an effective blow against the inevitable residual mite population.

The current cold spell of weather will both make the bees cluster together and also persuade the queens to cease - or at least minimise - egg-laying. With the resultant consequent of a near-absence of brood within the brood-nest those varroa mites which survived the late-summer treatments and have subsequently bred, will be forced to exist upon the bodies of the clustered adult bees where they are vulnerable to oxalic acid treatment.

Oxalic acid is a naturally-occurring organic acid normally found at low levels in honey. The acid treatment works by making direct physical contact with the varroa present on the adult bees thus preventing then from sucking hemolymph.. The acid does not penetrate any capped brood that may still be present but may kill any open brood. The combination of close-clustered bees, exposed varroa mites and a minimum of brood makes a period of about a month around the New Year the ideal time to treat colonies with an oxalic acid solution.

It must be remembered that honey bees are classed as food-producing animals and, as such, beekeepers are required to keep an up-to-date record of ALL veterinary medicines applied. If necessary, a suitable record 'card' may be downloaded from BeeBase.

Currently the approved oxalic acid treatments are Api-Bioxal, Oxuvar and VarroMed. These treatments plus instructions and application syringes are available from the several well-known bee equipment suppliers which advertise in the various beekeeping publications and on-line.

It is advisable to purchase, in December, sufficient treatment to treat all of the hives in early January. The dosage is 5ml per 'seam' of bees so an estimate will need to be made based upon the number of hives to be treated and the estimated strength of each colony. Be generous in making the estimate. Too much treatment to hand is better than too little!

Treat your colonies and so ensure that they enter spring with a minimal varroa mite load.
